be supplied in Paper at Stipulated prices, this Debt of £61,817.3.3 the Paper Mill, and all the other Effects of the Irish House, are to be given up to Mr. Pickering who is to be released from his liability to pay the Debts of the English House, and Bills drawn by him on the English House to the Amount of £2,065 are to be paid in full in order to render the Release to him effectual. — Richardson & Co. the Bill Brokers, hold a Security on the Irish Mills to Secure payment of the Bills they hold, and they are also to be paid in full out of the £7,113. —

For the State of the affairs, Mr. Kaye referred to Messrs. Swain, Stevens & Co's Letter of the 13<sup>th</sup> instant, and the Accounts therein referred. —

Supposing the arrangements to which Mr. Kaye referred to be prudential ones, under all the Circumstances, yet there are further arrangements proposed in the Trust Deed which appear to be exceptionable. — The Trustees are authorized to Compound with, and even to pay in full, any Creditors who may refuse to accede to the Trust Deed. — This is holding out a pretty strong temptation to.



to the Creditors to withhold their assent. - There is also a power to pay Dividends to Creditors who hold Securities, without first realizing their Securities, which is giving a great advantage to those Creditors. - As soon as 10<sup>th</sup> in the Pound is paid or sufficient received to pay it. Magnay & Co. are to Assign over all their Effects and be released, and their Release is not to depend upon the actual payment of that Sum to the Creditors but upon a Certificate to be signed by the Trustees on the Deed that sufficient is received to pay 10<sup>th</sup> -

"A Letter of License is given to Magnay & Co. till the 9<sup>th</sup> July 1828. The Deed contains a covenant of Indemnity from the Creditors to the Trustees, and making the Solvent Creditors answerable <sup>to</sup> those who may be insolvent. - Under any Circumstances this is objectionable, and has been uniformly rejected by the Bank in every Case. -

There appears to be so many  
Devices

Devices and Contrivances, resorted to in this case to avoid a Bankruptcy, and no statement whatever of the private property of any of the Partners being brought forward, that Mr. Kaye could not recommend the Arrangements to the approval and Acceptance of the Bank. From the Situation in Life in which the Partners lived, some of them at least, must have possessed private Property, and yet not the smallest notice is taken of any thing of the kind. - The whole object of the Deed appears to be, first, the prevention of Bankruptcy by every possible means, even by paying the refractory Creditors in full, and second, to obtain the Release of the Debtors as soon as the Trustees shall Certify, - sufficient has been recovered to pay 10s in the Pound, although the fund may be appropriated to satisfy defactory Creditors or otherways misapplied.
