Mr. Kaye laid before the Committee a Letter from Wm Henry Stanford giving further information respecting Venders and Utterers of Forged Bank Notes, and particularly as to Gardner, who is now in custody: — and appealing to the Mercy and Consideration of the Bank to spare his Life, — offering his Services to detect the Forgers of Notes, Should the Bank in any degree think him worthy their compassion. —

A Letter was read from The Rev. C. A. Stewart, of Ewhurst, Guildford, Stating that John Arrow who was a Witness on the Trials of Worsfield at Kingston, and who endeavored to establish an Alibi for the Prisoner, is a very suspicious and bad Character, and he hoped the Bank would prosecute him for Perjury;— in which case the Association of Gentlemen for the detection and Punishment of Persons for Breaches of the Law in that Neighbourhood were ready to render any assistance in their Power on the Occasion.—

Ordered, That Mr. Kaye be directed to write to Mr. Stewart and acquaint him that the Bank cannot comply with his proposal.—
