

Getting you thinking...

In 2009, a woman in Israel decided to surprise her mother by buying her a new mattress. It was a generous gift, likely rooted in a concern for her mum's back. As the old mattress was driven off to a tip in Tel Aviv, the daughter proudly presented her mother with a newer, comfier model.

A golden responsibility

'Here at the Bank of England, like any other bank, we store money. Deep underground in the vaults in our head office in Threadneedle Street are rows and rows of brand-new £5, £10, £20 and £50 banknotes, ready to be distributed when they are needed. But our vaults are better known as a place of safekeeping for something else: gold. We look after gold for governments and some other central banks. It is a job that the Bank of England has been doing for more than 300 years. Today there are around 400,000 bars of gold worth over £200 billion stored in the Bank's vaults. This amounts to a fifth of all the gold in the world. If stacked all on top of each other, it would reach the height of forty-six Eiffel Towers. This gold covers over 300,000 square feet – equivalent to almost ten football pitches.'
